

### **RUST DE WINTER DAM – 13 APRIL**

This was a day outing that I almost didn't go on but, fortunately for me, a severe case of FOMO kept me on that list. What we thought was going to be a normal day trip around the Rust De Winter Dam turned into a very special day of bird drives and pontoon cruises in the Rust De Winter Conservancy. This was organised by Thinus van Staden in conjunction with Pieter Smith (from the RDWC).

We met on the Dinokeng Road before 6 am, extremely excited about the day ahead, and after introductions were made and the days plans were discussed, we drove into the conservancy. We were divided into two groups of nine people. The first group would do the bird drive first whilst the other group went on the pontoon cruise, each of these were expected to be about two hours long.

Pieter accompanied our group on the bird drive around the Conservancy showing us the various habitats and outlined their vision for this wonderful conservancy. Unfortunately, due to the recent rains, we were unable to access some areas where the Pygmy Geese have been seen swimming amongst the lilies. We saw some great birds on the drive including Pale Chanting Goshawk, Southern White-crowned Shrike, Burnt-necked Eremomela, Brubru, Brown-crowned Tchagra, Little Bittern, and the largest flock of Red-faced Mousebirds ever (seriously there must have been more than 50)!

Then it was our turn to go on the pontoon. We boarded and set off with great excitement. What a fantastic way to bird watch! We were stunned into silence at the beauty and tranquillity around us as we floated across the Rust De Winter Dam. Lily pads with beautiful flowers dotted the surface and provided us with many photographic opportunities of the long-legged, long-toed African Jacanas and shy Black Crakes that darted across them.

There is a diverse array of bird life on the Rust De Winter Dam. Among the sightings were Giant and Pied Kingfishers, Gabar Goshawk, Common Moorhen, African Darters, African Fish Eagle, and Reed Cormorants basking in the sun with their wings outstretched. The highlight of the cruise was undoubtedly the Allen's Gallinule, both an adult and a juvenile were seen. It was wonderful to be able to compare their different plumages. The Allen's Gallinule was also a lifer for many of us.

The pontoon cruise on the Rust De Winter Dam was an experience that I won't forget too quickly. The tranquillity, the beautiful lily pad flowers in the dam, the bird life, every moment spent on the Rust De Winter Dam was a privilege. Our heartfelt thanks to Thinus for arranging this special trip, as well as to Pieter Smith for sharing the wonders of Rust De Winter Conservancy with us.

### REGIONAL AND LOCAL RARITIES AND INTERESTING SIGHTINGS



April started with a great record of a **Lark-like Bunting** – another provincial rarity at the fountain on the Magalies MBT & hiking trail.

Walter Sisulu BG also hosted a **Lark-like Bunting** during this reporting period. (Hennie Storm)

Suikerbosrand NR continued delivering rarities, such as Lark-like Bunting, Swallow-tailed Beeeaters, Pale Chanting Goshawk and late departing European Honey Buzzard, all reported by Niall Perrins.

A **Lark-like Bunting** was seen by Etienne Marais, as well as a flock of **Swallow-tailed Bee-eaters** at Rietvlei NR, on 11 April.



He also reported a fly-over of a **Black Stork** at Dinokeng. Of interest in the 100 km Wider Gauteng region, Etienne submitted sightings of

of **Pink-backed Pelicans** at Rockwall Dam, and **Short-clawed Lark** in North-West, this locality about a 100 km east of its known distribution range on the Botswana border and south of the population occurring in the Polokwane region.

Mike Pope reported a **Dwarf Bittern** at Northern Farm mid-April.

Zaagkuildrift had a **Pale Chanting Goshawk**, as well as a **Lizard Buzzard**, spotted by BLNG members, on 21 April. A **Pink-backed Pelican**, flying over the Kgomo-Kgomo bridge, saw Pieter Verster ready, as always, to catch the action.



Another great sighting for Gauteng was an **African Openbill** at Korsmans Bird Sanctuary on 28 April. (Raymond Campling)


